Dear Players and Parents,

We would like to welcome you and your family to the 2024 "Little Mo" West Regionals tournament in Berkeley, California on the 27th Annual "Road to the Little Mo Nationals"! This prestigious event will be held at the Berkeley Tennis Club (host site), Claremont Club & Spa, Oakland Hills Tennis Club, and Saint Mary's College of California from Saturday, July 20 - Monday, July 22, 2024. Approximately 280 players from 18 different states across the USA will be featured in this regional tournament! With so many talented players from around the country, we hope it will be a fantastic weekend filled with new friendships, great sportsmanship, and competitive tennis. Thank you so much for your support of the "Little Mo" and a special thank you to our tournament sites, volunteers, and proud sponsors: Jersey Mike's Subs (Title Sponsor), Tennis Competitors of Dallas (TCD), and Wilson Sporting Goods ("Official Racquet, String, and Ball").

The "Little Mo" began in 1976 as a local tournament for Dallas youngsters and later grew to include players from all over Texas. In 1998, it expanded nationwide and became known as the "Road to the Little Mo Nationals", one of the premier series of junior tournaments for boys and girls ages 8, 9, 10, 11, and 12. The Road is now in its 27th year as a yearlong circuit of regional and national tournaments for players who reside in the USA and its territories. It is the only circuit of its kind for talented, high-performance boys and girls in the United States who compete against others born in the same year.

The Road begins in the spring and summer with the four "Little Mo" Regionals (North, South, East, West) held in different cities across the United States. Yellow (regular) ball divisions will be offered for boys and girls ages 8, 9, 10, 11, and 12 in addition to a green dot option for ages 8, 9, and 10. The top four <u>yellow ball</u> players (semifinalists) in each age division from each "Little Mo" Regionals will advance to the prestigious "Little Mo" Nationals in Austin, Texas. These players will form a 16-size draw in each age division at the Nationals. The top 160 players who reach the Nationals are the youngest and brightest future stars in American tennis!

The "Little Mo" tournaments are designed to provide outstanding competition at the regional, national, and international level while also encouraging players to develop new friendships, learn good sportsmanship, and most of all, have fun. The "Little Mo" is also unique in that it gives youngsters the opportunity to gauge their ability against players born in the same year (i.e., 8's play 8's, 9's play 9's). Over the years, many well-known collegiate players and famous tennis professionals have participated in the "Little Mo" tournaments including Andy Roddick, Taylor Fritz, Tommy Paul, Belinda Bencic, Coco Gauff, Madison Keys, Leylah Fernandez, Dominic Thiem, Emma Raducanu, Sebastian Korda, Christopher Eubanks, Jenson Brooksby, Brandon Nakashima, Vasek Pospisil, Borna Coric, Mackie McDonald, Denis Kudla, Ryan Harrison, Taylor Townsend, Donald Young, Steve Johnson, Sofia Kenin, CiCi Bellis, and Ana Konjuh among many others. Roddick won the "Little Mo" in 1992 (age 10) and he said, "the "Little Mo" was my first big win!" Gauff won the "Little Mo" in 2012 (age 8) and she said, "the "Little Mo" is where the belief began." This is all wonderful news for junior tennis and we are so proud that the "Little Mo" continues to be one of the most popular events for young players around the world.

Matches will begin on Saturday, July 20 and continue through Monday, July 22. The winner of each age division will be crowned a "Little Mo" Regionals champion! For all draws and results, please visit:

The "Little Mo" tournaments are hosted by MCB in memory of its tennis champion namesake, Maureen "Little Mo" Connolly Brinker. Born in San Diego, Maureen became the first woman to achieve the Grand Slam of tennis in 1953 by winning all four major championships (Australian, French, Wimbledon, and US Open) in the same year. She was well known for her powerful groundstrokes from the baseline, which earned her the famous nickname "Little Mo" - a comparison to the explosive firepower of the battleship USS Missouri, also known as "Big Mo". Only five players in the history of tennis have won the calendar Grand Slam, and Maureen is still the only American woman and the youngest at age 18 to have accomplished this magnificent feat. She won an amazing nine consecutive championship titles (three US, three Wimbledon, two French, one Australian) - undefeated in 50 matches.

Unfortunately, her spectacular career would be short-lived due to a horseback riding accident in 1954. While she could no longer compete at an elite level, Maureen's legacy as a legendary tennis star would continue through the Maureen Connolly Brinker Tennis Foundation (MCB). Founded in 1968 with her dear friend Nancy Jeffett, MCB's mission would be the promotion and support of junior tennis development worldwide. That same year, she was inducted into the prestigious International Tennis Hall of Fame in Newport, Rhode Island. Sadly, Maureen lost her valiant battle with cancer the following year and passed away at the young age of 34. Although her tennis career only spanned three years, many premier sportswriters consider Maureen Connolly to be the finest of all female players for her achievements on and off the court. In 2019, she was honored by the United States Postal Service with her very own "Little Mo" Commemorative Forever Stamp.

Today, MCB continues to support the growth of junior tennis by organizing numerous "Little Mo" tournaments throughout the United States annually for talented boys and girls (ages 8-16). These events are designed to provide outstanding competition at the regional, national, and international level while also encouraging players to develop new friendships, learn good sportsmanship, and most of all, have fun. The "Little Mo" tournaments are also unique in that young players have the opportunity to gauge their ability against others born in the same year from around the world (i.e., 8's play 8's, 9's play 9's). MCB strives to empower young athletes by giving travel grants, "Mo" Coins for prizes, and also Sportsmanship and Kindness awards to deserving individuals in honor of Maureen's legacy. The Foundation also contributes financially to many notable programs including the National Junior Tennis League for inner-city youth and Invest In A Child for deaf and wheelchair tennis

Maureen Connolly was known for her outstanding victories, but more importantly for her exemplary sportsmanship and kindness on and off the court. To honor her legacy, the "Little Mo" offers special "Mo" Coins to players who display good sportsmanship and who are respectful and kind to others. The referee, officials, and tournament staff will have the colorful "Mo" Coins in their pockets to give to players during the event. All players will be able to trade in their coins for prizes at the "Little Mo" Booth at the Berkeley Tennis Club (host site). Sportsmanship Awards will also be given to two deserving players selected by the officials during the tournament.

In addition to the "Little Mo" Regionals, we hope you will join us for one (or both) of the two remaining "Little Mo" Internationals (New Jersey and Florida) - open to any player worldwide (ages 8-12 NJ and ages 8-16 FL)! In 2006, MCB created the "Little Mo" Internationals for USA players to experience different styles of play and meet others from various countries and cultures from around the world. This flagship event was first held in Texas and it has evolved over the years into three

different events held in Colorado, New Jersey, and Florida. Today, the Internationals attract thousands of talented boys and girls (ages 8, 9, 10, 11, and 12) who travel from across the United States and worldwide to compete against others born in the same year. The "Big Mo" divisions have also been added in Colorado and Florida for ages 13, 14, 15, and 16. These unique tournaments are held at some of the most prominent and historic tennis clubs in the United States, which helps to create an unforgettable experience and enjoyable vacation for the entire family. There are also many fun tourist attractions and sights to see near our three international events such as Pikes Peak, Garden of the Gods, US Open, Times Square, Statue of Liberty, Broadway shows, Disney World, Epcot, and beautiful beaches.

This year, our host sites are the U.S. Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs, Colorado (June 28 - July 3), the West Orange Tennis Club in West Orange, New Jersey (August 17-21), and the Palm Beach Gardens Tennis Center in Palm Beach Gardens, Florida (December 6-11). In Colorado and Florida, yellow (regular) ball divisions will be offered for boys and girls ages 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, and 16 in addition to a green dot option for ages 8, 9, and 10. In New Jersey, yellow (regular) ball divisions will be offered for boys and girls ages 8, 9, 10, 11, and 12 in addition to a green dot option for ages 8, 9, and 10. The "Big Mo" divisions (ages 13, 14, 15, and 16) will **not** be offered due to limited courts in New Jersey. All players will have an opportunity to participate in Singles, Doubles, and Mixed Doubles in addition to many exciting and memorable activities such as the Player Clinic, Player Parade, Group Photo, Opening Ceremony, Player Gift Exchange, "Mo" Coins, Player Party, "Little Mo/Big Mo" Booth, and much more. Last year, the "Little Mo" Internationals in Florida featured over 700 players from 60 different countries! Registration for all international tournaments will be on a **first-come. first-served basis up to the entry limit - we will be accepting the first 14 players in New Jersey and the first 30 players in Florida in each division.** If a division reaches the entry limit before the registration deadline! All yellow ball results from the "Little Mo" Internationals (Colorado, New Jersey, Florida) will count towards your player's Universal Tennis Color Ball Rating (CBR). Have you ever dreamed of winning the tallest trophy in junior tennis? In 2013, MCB created the ultimate challenge for any player (ages 8-12) to win the "Little Mo" Slam. The Slam was created in honor of Maureen Connolly's Grand Slam win in 1953 - winning all four major championships (Australian, French, Wimbledon, and US Open) in the same calendar year. If a "Little Mo" player can win their yellow hall division at all three Internationals (Colorado, New Jersey, Florida) in the same year, they will receive the tallest trophy in junior tennis (6 feet tall) and the title of "Little Mo" Slam Champion! The Slam continues this year with the 1st leg at the U.S. Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs, Colorado (June 28 - July 3). The 2nd leg will be held at the West Orange Tennis Club in West Orange, New Jersey (August 17-21). The 3rd and final leg will take place at the Palm Beach Gardens Tennis Center in Palm Beach Gardens Florida (December 6-11). There have been eleven players who have accomplished this magnificent feat in the past eleven years. Who will win the "Little Mo" Slam title in this special anniversary year?



Please note that the Player List is NOT posted on the USTA or UTR homepages (you must click on the link to view the Player List).

Draws / Match Times: The draws and first-day match times for all divisions will be posted on the tournament's USTA homepage (link included above) by Thursday evening, July 18 (not before 7:00pm - Pacific Time). We will be sending out an email to all registered players when the draws/match times are posted online. When the draws/match times are posted online, please click on the "Draws" tab, select your age division in the list, and look for your player's name in the draw. Please note that the USTA platform will include all players and their individual age divisions under the general headings of: "8 & under", "10 & under", and "12 & under". This simply means that the 8's players and their draws will be found under the "8 & under" headings, the 9's and 10's players and their draws will be found under the "10 & under" headings, and the 11's and 12's players and their draws will be found under the "12 & under" headings. Unfortunately, the USTA platform is unable to have specific headers for each individual age division at this time. Also, we would just like to let you know that while the USTA name and logo is featured at the top of the drawsheets, MCB Tennis Foundation is a separate non-profit organization that it is not affiliated with the USTA. We do follow most of the USTA guidelines, employ USTA officials, and sometimes use their software to run our "Little Mo" tournaments, but we are a separate organization.

Match Locations / Tournament Desks: All matches for this tournament will be played at the following three sites: Berkeley Tennis Club (abbreviated as "BTC" on the draws online), Oakland Hills Tennis Club (abbreviated as "OAK" on the draws online), and Saint Mary's College of California (abbreviated as "SMC" on the draws online). The draws online will include the specific playing site for your player's match when posted. Once you know the location for your player's match, you can go directly to that site. There will be a Tournament Desk at all playing sites so there is no need to go to the Berkeley Tennis Club first if you are playing at another site. Please remember to check your draw carefully each day for the correct match time and location. Also, please check in at least 30 minutes prior to each match at the Tournament Desk while allowing some extra time for traffic and parking.

Results / Next Day Match Times: The draws online will be updated throughout the event with results as matches are completed throughout the day. The Saturday match times will be posted on Thursday evening, July 18 (not before 7:00pm). The Sunday match times will be posted at the conclusion of play on Saturday (not before 7:00pm) and the Monday match times will be posted at the conclusion of play on Sunday (not before 7:00pm). The USTA homepage will have the most up-to-date information about the tournament so please save and bookmark the URL above. Be sure to check the tournament's USTA homepage on a regular basis for important updates during the event (weather, draw changes, et cetera).







27th Annual "Road to the Little Mo Nationals" Rules and Regulations

Welcome to the 27th Annual "Road to the Little Mo Nationals"! These tournaments are designed to provide outstanding competition at the regional and national level while also encouraging players to develop new friendships, learn good sportsmanship, and most of all, have fun. The Road is the only circuit of its kind for talented, high-performance girls and boys in the United States who compete against others born in the same year. Please read through the following rules and regulations carefully:

Eligibility: The Road will begin in the spring and summer with the four "Little Mo" Regionals (North, South, East, West) held in different cities across the United States. The regional tournaments are open to any player who lives in the United States and its territories (ages 8, 9, 10, 11, and 12). There are no special qualifications or ranking needed to register for the regional tournaments - any USA player who registers will be accepted into the draw until the entry limit is reached. *Please note that players must have lived in the United States for at least six consecutive months prior to the tournament start date in order to be eligible for the "Little Mo" Regionals. If a player does not meet this requirement, they will be withdrawn from the tournament.

Entry Limit / Confirmation Email: Registration for the "Little Mo" Regionals will be on a first-come, first-served basis up to the entry limit - we will be accepting the first 32 players in each division. If a division reaches the entry limit before the registration deadline, a WAITING LIST will be established at that time. Be sure to register early as the draws typically fill before the registration deadline! *Please note that once you have received a confirmation email from UTR/Stripe, your player's entry has been accepted into the tournament and you can make your travel arrangements.

<u>Multiple Tournaments</u>: Players may compete in any "Little Mo" Regionals regardless of where they are currently living in the United States or its territories. Players may also compete in as many regional tournaments as desired, but they only need to participate in one regional tournament and finish in the top four (<u>yellow ball division only</u>) to qualify for the "Little Mo" Nationals.

Events / Guaranteed Matches: The "Little Mo" Regionals and the "Little Mo" Nationals will offer <u>Singles</u> events for all divisions (<u>no Doubles or Mixed Doubles events</u>). All players will be guaranteed at least two Singles matches during the regional and national tournaments.

Age Eligibility / Registration by Birth Year: Players <u>must</u> register in the proper age division according to their birth year. This ensures that our players are competing against others who are born in the same calendar year (i.e., a player born in 2014 must play in the 10's division since they will be turning 10 this year).

- Girls and Boys 12's born in 2012
- Girls and Boys 11's born in 2013
- Girls and Boys 10's born in 2014
- Girls and Boys 9's born in 2015
- Girls and Boys 8's born in 2016 (Only players who are born in 2016 will be allowed to play in the 8's divisions.
- Players born in 2017 or 2018 will **not** be eligible.)

<u>Divisions</u>: Yellow (regular) ball divisions will be offered for girls and boys ages 8, 9, 10, 11, and 12 in addition to a green dot option for ages 8, 9, and 10. <u>Players must register for only one division</u>. This means that players competing in the 8's, 9's, and 10's divisions must choose to play with either the yellow (regular) ball <u>or</u> the green dot ball for their age group. Players in the 11's and 12's divisions must play with the yellow (regular) ball. All divisions will be played on a full 78' tennis court with either the yellow (regular) ball or the green dot ball.

Draw Formats: All divisions will use the same draw formats regardless of age or ball type, but we will be using several different draw formats based on the draw size:

- 32-size draw: A Modified Feed-in Consolation format through the Round of 16 with a 3rd/4th Place playoff and 5th/6th Place playoff will be used. This means that any player who loses before the Quarterfinal Round (Main Draw) will feed back into the Consolation bracket. The losers of the Quarterfinal Round (Main Draw) will move into a 5th/6th Place playoff and the losers of the Semifinal Round (Main Draw) will move into a 3rd/4th Place playoff.
- <u>16-size draw</u>: A Feed-in Consolation format through the Quarterfinals with a 3rd/4th Place playoff will be used. This means that any player who loses before the Semifinal Round (Main Draw) will feed back into the Consolation bracket. The losers of the Semifinal Round (Main Draw) will move into a 3rd/4th Place playoff. A 5th/6th Place playoff is not possible as the Consolation Winner and Consolation Runner-Up are the 5th/6th Place winners in this format.
- <u>8-size draw</u>: A First Round Losers Consolation format with a 3rd/4th Place playoff will be used. This means that any player who loses in the First Round (Main Draw) will move into the Consolation bracket. A Feed-in format is not possible as the Second Round (Main Draw) is the Semifinal Round, and the losers of the Semifinal Round (Main Draw) will move into a 3rd/4th Place playoff. A 5th/6th Place playoff is also not possible as the Consolation Winner and Consolation Runner-Up are the 5th/6th Place winners in this format.
- <u>5 or less players</u>: A Round Robin format will be used.

Scoring Format: All divisions will use the same scoring format regardless of age, ball type or draw format. All Singles matches (Main Draw and Consolation) will consist of two tiebreak sets (first to 6 games). At 6 games all, a 7- point set tiebreak (first to 7, win by 2) will be played. If players split sets, a 10-point match tiebreak (first to 10, win by 2) will be played in lieu of a third set. Regular scoring (with ad) will be used for all Main Draw matches and a 5- minute warm-up will be given before each match. No-ad scoring will be used for all Consolation matches in addition to the 3rd/4th Place playoff and the 5th/6th Place playoff. A 2-minute rest period will be given between the first and second sets, and a 3-minute rest period will be given between the second set and match tiebreak. No coaching is allowed at any time. *Shortened scoring may be used in the case of rain.

*NEW IN 2024 - Bathroom Break Courtesy Point: If a player needs to go to the bathroom, they need to get permission from an official. To minimize loss of momentum during the set caused by a bathroom break, the player taking the break will give a courtesy point to their opponent. This is not a penalty point. A courtesy point will not be given for a bathroom break taken at the end of a set. This rule is unique to the "Little Mo" tournaments.

Advancing to "Little Mo" Nationals: The top four <u>yellow ball</u> players (semifinalists) in each age division from each "Little Mo" Regionals will advance to the prestigious "Little Mo" Nationals in Austin, Texas from September 27-30, 2024. These players will form a 16-size draw in each age division at the Nationals. If you advance to the Semifinal Round (Main Draw) in your age division at the Regionals and you (and your parent/coach) have followed the Code of Conduct, you will receive your Nationals invitation with a special code needed for registration by email from the MCB office following the regional tournament. The top 160 players who reach the Nationals are the youngest and brightest future stars in American tennis!

Alternate Players for "Little Mo" Nationals: If one of the top four <u>yellow ball</u> players (semifinalists) from a "Little Mo" Regionals cannot attend the "Little Mo" Nationals, we will contact the 5th and 6th Place winners (if applicable) to take their place as the first and second alternates. If neither player can attend, we will consider other players in the draw and players from other regional tournaments as replacements based on their results and UTR. If there is <u>not</u> a 5th/6th Place playoff, we will contact the Consolation Winner as the first alternate instead. If the Consolation Winner cannot attend, we will consider other players in the draw and players from other regional tournaments as replacements based on their results and UTR. The MCB office will let you know as soon as possible via email if there is an opening to attend the Nationals. While the green dot players will <u>not</u> be able to advance to the Nationals, they might be considered as replacement players if all of the qualified yellow ball players have been contacted.

<u>Universal Tennis Rating (UTR) / Color Ball Rating (CBR)</u>: All yellow ball results from the "Road to the Little Mo Nationals" (Regionals, Nationals) will count towards your player's Universal Tennis Rating (UTR). All green dot results will count towards your player's Universal Tennis Color Ball Rating (CBR).

Code of Conduct for "Little Mo" Tournaments

The "Little Mo" tournaments are organized by the Maureen Connolly Brinker Tennis Foundation (MCB). These events are named in memory of Maureen "Little Mo" Connolly Brinker, who was known for her outstanding sportsmanship on and off the court. Your participation in the "Little Mo" tournament should reflect this gold standard of behavior. In registering for any "Little Mo" tournament, we expect all players, parents, coaches, spectators, and other participants to adhere to its Code of Conduct. That includes exhibiting the following behavior:

- 1. You must be considerate and respectful of the rights of all participants and spectators regardless of their age, gender, ability, race, cultural background, sexual orientation, or religious beliefs.
- 2. You must play within the rules of tennis and respect the officials and their decisions. There shall be no arguments, no displays of aggressiveness, no cursing or profane behavior, no volatile anger, or similar behavior against the referees, other players, opponents, or members of the tournament committee.
- 3. You must play fairly. Cheating of any kind will <u>not</u> be tolerated, including but not limited to, intentionally and willfully calling the lines incorrectly, calling the score incorrectly, and intentionally delaying the game.
- 4. You will <u>not</u> receive or offer any form of coaching from the sidelines during match play.
- 5. You must look presentable on court and pick up after yourself at all times.
- 6. You are expected to be positive, respectful, and supportive of other players.
- 7. MCB has a zero-tolerance policy for any person videotaping or capturing the image of opposing players, their family members, or guests with the intent of posting derogatory, offensive, or disparaging comments about them online or on any social media platform. This includes, but is not limited to, Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, YouTube, LinkedIn, and TikTok. MCB will not permit this kind of demeaning behavior related to any of its "Little Mo" tournaments. Consequences of this action may include the immediate default of a player from the tournament and/or the dismissal of the offending parent, coach, spectator, or participant from the tournament, in addition to other consequences as determined by MCB.
- 8. Most "Little Mo" tournaments use multiple playing sites due to the large number of players involved in the event. If you have more than one child entered in a tournament, MCB is <u>not</u> able to guarantee they will be playing at the same site. Therefore, it is highly recommended to bring an additional guardian for each child you bring to a tournament. <u>For safety reasons, a player should not be left alone without a guardian at any time</u>.

Parents / Coaches / Spectators / Other Participants:

- No coaching, hand signals, or any communication with the player when on court. Only English can be spoken when the player is on court.
- No clapping when the opponent double faults or makes an unforced error.
- No loud, excessive or constant cheering/clapping that is disruptive or distracting to players while on court. This includes cheering that distracts other players on adjacent courts and cheering across another court during a match.
- No interference with the match or arguing with, yelling at, or threatening the officials or Tournament Director. Their decisions are final.
- No yelling at or threatening anyone especially players.
- Emotional, physical, or sexual misconduct will **not** be tolerated at "Little Mo" tournaments. This includes but is not limited to child abuse, endangerment, and neglect.

Players:

- No coaching, hand signals, or any communication is allowed during your match. Only English can be spoken when the player is on court.
- No cursing or yelling on court. This includes yelling "come on" or other distracting outbursts that can be heard on other courts.
- No hitting the ball to the back of the fence or the net in anger.
- No hitting the ball away from the player when it is their serve.
- The server must announce the score loudly in English before every point. All players must know how to keep score and announce it correctly.
- If a player needs to go to the bathroom, they must ask an official for permission. We encourage players to only go to the bathroom at a set break to minimize loss of momentum during the set. Any player taking a bathroom break that is **not** at the end of a set must give a courtesy point to their opponent. Players will be accompanied to and from the bathroom by an official when possible.
- Play fair! No cheating of any kind will be tolerated. Please make correct line calls if in doubt about a call, it is IN. No delay of game.

We would like everyone to have a wonderful and memorable experience at the "Little Mo" tournaments. Let the memory of your match be a good one for both you and your opponent, whether you win or lose.

Consequences of Behavior:

During a Match:

The officials will be watching the matches closely and if a player breaches the Code of Conduct during the match, the player will be given:

- 1. First offense: A warning.
- 2. Second offense: A point penalty.
- 3. Third offense: A game penalty.

If the behavior continues after the game penalty, additional game penalties will continue to be given until the match is over. The behavior of parents, coaches, spectators, and other participants can also cause their player to receive the above penalties, and may also result in consequences to the offending individual, including removal. However, the tournament committee has the discretion to issue an immediate default to the player in cases where the conduct rises to a level at which an official determines that, in the interest of fairness or the health and safety of participants, the match cannot proceed.

In addition to the above, an official may, in his or her discretion, take the following actions, among others, in the event of a breach of the Code of Conduct by a player, parent, coach, spectator, or other participant: issue a warning OR begin the ejection and/or default process.

If a parent/guardian is ejected from a match and/or the premises, their player will forfeit any match in progress and will be asked to leave with their parent/guardian unless (1) another parent/guardian is available to stay with the player; or (2) the parent/guardian's misconduct was directed at the player and MCB believes the parent/guardian poses an immediate threat to the player, in which case the Tournament Director and MCB will work with the player and law enforcement, if needed, to determine appropriate steps.

Any ruling made by an official and/or the tournament committee during a match is final.

Additional Consequences:

Regardless of whether an official issues a penalty during a match, MCB may take the following additional actions, in its discretion and without limitation, in response to a breach of this Code of Conduct: refuse the entry of any player wanting to register for any "Little Mo" tournament; not invite a player to the next round of the "Road to the Little Mo Nationals" circuit; prohibit a player or other individual from attending "Little Mo" events for any period of time, up to a lifetime ban; impose conditions on an individual's attendance at "Little Mo" events; revoke any trophies or travel grants from any player.

Repeated violations at the same match or multiple matches over time may also result in additional penalties.

Law Enforcement:

MCB reserves the right to call or report behavior to law enforcement when required and when MCB otherwise deems necessary or appropriate according to USTA Safe Play guidelines.

Reporting:

If you are a player, parent, coach, spectator, or other participant and you reasonably believe that an individual has breached this Code of Conduct, or that anyone at a "Little Mo" tournament (including officials and event staff) has committed emotional, physical, or sexual misconduct (including but not limited to child abuse), you may make a report to MCB at: carol@mcbtennis.org.

Parking - Berkeley Tennis Club: Street/metered parking will be available near the clubhouse and on the surrounding streets at the Berkeley Tennis Club (host site). Parking may also be available for a fee and based on availability at the Claremont Club & Spa hotel next to the Berkeley Tennis Club (the fee is hourly and can be very expensive). Please note that players can be dropped off at the front of the clubhouse while you find parking nearby. Also, please be mindful of any handicapped parking spots and make sure to read all of the posted parking signs/regulations very carefully or your car may be towed!

Parking - Oakland Hills Tennis Club: Complimentary self-parking will be available at the Oakland Hills Tennis Club, but we are asking our families to please park on the road alongside the club and <u>not in the clubhouse parking lot as this area is reserved for members.</u> Please note that players can be dropped off at the front of the clubhouse while you find parking nearby. <u>Also, please be mindful of any handicapped parking spots and make sure to read all of the posted parking signs/regulations very carefully or your car may be towed!</u>

Parking - Saint Mary's College of California: Street/metered parking will be available near the facility - possibly \$5/day. Please note that players can be dropped off at the front of the facility while you find parking. Also, please be mindful of any handicapped parking spots and make sure to read all of the posted parking signs/regulations very carefully or your car may be towed!

Alternate Sites / Transportation Recommendations: In addition to the Berkeley Tennis Club (host site), we will be using 1-2 additional alternate sites on Saturday, Sunday, and potentially Monday as well if there is any inclement weather during the tournament. One alternate site will be the Oakland Hills Tennis Club which is located about 10 minutes away from the Berkeley Tennis Club. Another alternate site will be the Saint Mary's College of California which is located about 22 minutes away from the Berkeley Tennis Club. While all of our alternate sites will be relatively close to the Berkeley Tennis Club, we do recommend renting a car if you do not already have transportation. A ride-sharing service such as Uber or Lyft might also be an option based on availability in the area. Regardless of which playing site you have at the beginning of the tournament, all matches should be coming back to the Berkeley Tennis Club for the final day(s) of the event. (VERY IMPORTANT) Water / Ice / Sunscreen / Shade: It may be hot this weekend so please remember to hydrate adequately before and during the tournament. Water and ice should be available at all playing sites, but we encourage our players and their families to bring their own water and ice for their coolers - please do not fill up your coolers from the ice machines. It is best to bring your own water bottles and cups too if needed. We would also recommend bringing any sunscreen, umbrellas, sunglasses, and canopy/folding chairs if needed as there may be limited shade at each playing site.

Host Hotel Information: Our host hotel for the West Regionals tournament is the Hilton Garden Inn San Francisco/Oakland Bay Bridge hotel (1800 Powell Street, Emeryville, CA 94608). Most of our players and their families will be staying at the Hilton Garden Inn hotel during the tournament and it will be a great place to meet some new tennis friends. The hotel is located about 10 minutes away from the Berkeley Tennis Club (host site). Although our discounted room rate at the Hilton Garden Inn hotel expired on June 27, there might still be some rooms available this week due to last-minute cancellations - please contact the Hilton Garden Inn hotel directly at: (510) 658-9300 for any questions about their current rates and availability. Our courtesy room block featured \$148 Deluxe Double Queen rooms (before taxes). This rate included complimentary WiFi and self-parking (normally \$25 per vehicle per night) in addition to a discounted hot breakfast buffet (\$10 per person per day) among other amenities. *Special Note about your Hotel Reservation in relation to Alternate Sites and Divisions: If you decide not to stay at our host hotel, it is still best to make your reservations near the Berkeley Tennis Club (host site) as all of the playing sites for this tournament will be relatively close to each other. Please note that we will <u>not</u> know where specific age divisions will be playing until the draws/match times are posted. Also, players may be competing at different sites throughout the tournament based on the scheduling (it is **not** guaranteed that players will be at the same site each day).

Entry Fee: \$165 per player (nonrefundable after extended registration deadline - Monday, July 8). Please note that Universal Tennis adds an additional \$12 fee on top of our entry fee if you have not upgraded to a UTR Power subscription - this additional fee is set by UTR. The entry fee helps to cover the cost of the courts, balls, officials, t-shirts, trophies, online registration fees, and other tournament expenses. A portion of the entry fee comes back to the Foundation to help further the development of junior tennis worldwide and is tax-deductible.

Withdrawal and Refund Policy: If you are unable to join us for the West Regionals tournament, please send an email as soon as possible to: matthew@mcbtennis.org to be withdrawn from the event. A player's entry fee was fully refundable up until the registration deadline posted on the tournament's UTR homepage - July 8 at 11:30pm (Central Time). At this time, any withdrawal requests will not be eligible for a refund or credit to a future tournament.

<u>Tennis Attire</u>: During the tournament, we ask our players to please wear nice tennis attire for their practice and matches - <u>colored clothing/shoes</u> <u>are acceptable and there are no logo restrictions.</u> An "all-white" attire is <u>not required</u> at any time for our regional tournaments. <u>Universal Tennis Rating (UTR)</u>: All yellow ball results from the "Road to the Little Mo Nationals" (Regionals, Nationals) will count towards your player's Universal Tennis Rating (UTR). All green dot results will also count towards the Universal Tennis Color Ball Rating (CBR).

Events / Guaranteed Matches: The "Little Mo" Regionals and the "Little Mo" Nationals will offer <u>Singles</u> events for all divisions (<u>no Doubles or Mixed Doubles events</u>). All players will be guaranteed at least two Singles matches during the regional and national tournaments.

Seeding: The order of seeding will be based on verified UTR ratings, which include "Little Mo" and other tournament results. The UTR ratings used to calculate the seedings are downloaded at the close of registration (about 1-2 weeks before the tournament start date).

<u>Warm-up/Practice Courts</u>: During the tournament, "warm-up courts" may be available at Berkeley Tennis Club from approximately 7:00-8:00am each morning on a first-come, first-served basis (no reservations will be taken). There will not be any warm-up courts available at any playing site after matches begin in the morning so please make other arrangements if you are needing a court during the day - there are several other clubs, facilities, and parks nearby for practice courts as well.

<u>Weather Updates / Rain Plan</u>: We are looking forward to sunny skies and completing our regional tournament this weekend. Player Gift Exchange (VERY IMPORTANT): It is a special "Little Mo" tradition that all players at our regional, national, and international tournaments exchange a small gift with their first-round opponent in Singles. The gift should be \$15 or less (wrapped or in a gift bag) and can represent your home city/state since your opponent will most likely be from a different area. The gifts are exchanged before the players walk on court for their first match. This is a fun way to meet a new friend on the first day and it will be a special memory for years to come. If you have a bye in the first round, please look at the draws posted at your playing site to find out with whom you will exchange gifts as you will be paired with another player who has a bye. If you have any questions about the Player Gift Exchange, please visit the "Little Mo" Booth during the tournament.

<u>Player Welcome Bag</u>: All players will be able to pick up their official welcome bag from the "Little Mo" Booth at the Berkeley Tennis Club (host site) on Saturday, July 20 (anytime). The welcome bag will include a tournament t-shirt, backpack, Wilson string packet, Wilson keychain "Mo" Money raffle ticket, and more. If you are unable to pick up your player's welcome bag at our host site on Saturday or you will be at another playing site on Saturday, you can stop by the "Little Mo" Booth at the Berkeley Tennis Club anytime during the tournament to pick it up!

<u>Trophies</u>: Trophies will be awarded in each division to the Main Draw Winner, Runner-Up, 3rd Place, 4th Place, 5th Place, and 6th Place as well as the Consolation Winner and Runner-Up. Sportsmanship Awards will also be given to two deserving players selected by the officials during the tournament

Advancing to the "Little Mo" Nationals: The top four <u>yellow ball</u> players (semifinalists) in each age division from each "Little Mo" Regionals will advance to the prestigious "Little Mo" Nationals in Austin, Texas. These players will form a 16-size draw in each age division at the Nationals. If you advance to the Semifinal Round (Main Draw) in your age division at the Regionals and you (and your parent/coach) have followed the Code of Conduct, you will receive your Nationals invitation with a special code needed for registration by email from the MCB office following the regional tournament. The top 160 players who reach the Nationals are the youngest and brightest future stars in American tennis!

Alternate Players for the "Little Mo" Nationals: If one of the top four <u>yellow ball</u> players (semifinalists) from a "Little Mo" Regionals cannot attend the "Little Mo" Nationals, we will contact the 5th and 6th Place winners (if applicable) to take their place as the first and second alternates. If neither player can attend, we will consider other players in the draw and other regional draws as replacements based on their results and UTR. If there is <u>not</u> a 5th/6th Place Playoff, we will contact the Consolation Winner as the first alternate instead. If the Consolation Winner cannot attend, we will consider other players in the draw and other regional draws as replacements based on their results and UTR. The MCB office will let you know as soon as possible via email if there is an opening to attend the Nationals. While the green dot players will <u>not</u> be able to advance to the Nationals, they might be considered as replacement players if all of the qualified yellow ball players have been contacted.

"Mo" Coins: Maureen Connolly was known for her powerful groundstrokes, but more importantly for her exemplary sportsmanship and kindness on and off the court. To honor her legacy, the "Little Mo" tournaments offer special "Mo" Coins to players who display good sportsmanship and who are respectful and kind to others. The referee, officials, and tournament staff will have the colorful "Mo" Coins in their pockets to give to players during the event. All players will be able to trade in their coins for prizes at the "Little Mo" Booth during the tournament. The "Little Mo" Booth will be located at the Berkeley Tennis Club (host site).

Also, please check in at least 30 minutes prior to each match at the Tournament Desk while allowing some extra time for traffic and parking.

Player Gift Exchange:

All players will exchange a small gift with their first-round opponent in Singles. Players, please exchange your gifts as you walk to the court for your first match. If you have a bye in the First Round (Main Draw), please look at the draws posted at your playing site to find out with whom you will exchange gifts as you will be paired with another player who has a bye. If you have any questions about the Player Gift Exchange, please visit the Tournament Desk during the tournament.

Sunday, July 21:

8:00am

Matches will begin as early as 8:00am and continue all day (typically 1-2 rounds of Main Draw Singles and 2 rounds of Consolation Singles will be scheduled based on draw sizes). Some smaller draws may finish.

Monday, July 22 (Final Day):

8:00am

Matches will begin as early as 8:00am and may continue into the late afternoon (typically larger Singles draws will be scheduled to finish on the last day). It is our goal to have most of the matches finished by the early afternoon, but some final matches may continue into the late afternoon depending on the schedule. Please plan your departure after 5:00pm on Monday, July 22 as matches will be played that day (some divisions may finish earlier depending on draw size and weather).

TOURNAMENT RULES

Welcome to the 2024 "Little Mo" West Regionals in Berkeley, California! When players step out on court for a match, they become responsible for what happens on their court. The following tournament rules apply:

MATCH FORMAT, SCORING, AND RULES:

- All age divisions (8, 9, 10, 11, and 12) will use the same scoring format regardless of draw format or ball type. All Singles matches (Main Draw and Consolation) will consist of two tiebreak sets (first to 6 games). At 6 games all, a 7-point set tiebreak (first to 7, win by 2) will be played. If players split sets, a 10-point match tiebreak (first to 10, win by 2) will be played in lieu of a third set. Regular scoring (with ad) will be used for all Main Draw matches and a 5-minute warm-up will be given before each match. No-ad scoring will be used for all Consolation matches in addition to the 3rd/4th Place playoff and the 5th/6th Place playoff. A 2-minute rest period will be given between the first and second sets, and a 3-minute rest period will be given between the second set and match tiebreak. No coaching is allowed at any time.

 *Shortened scoring may be used in the case of rain.
- Both players must return to the Tournament Desk after each match to report the score.
- All players will decide service and side before starting their warm-up for the match. There will be a 5-minute warm-up for all Main Draw and Consolation matches.
- <u>The server must announce the score loudly before each point</u>. Players are also responsible for keeping the score and using scorekeepers at all times.
- The receiver must play to the reasonable pace of the server. The maximum time between points is 25 seconds.
- If a player is unsure of a call, the ball is good (benefit of the doubt goes to the opponent).
- Whether on or off the court, officials will overrule any clear mistakes they observe and may also call foot faults.
- A player can request a medical time out for illness or an injury. The player may choose someone (a parent or coach) to treat them. An official will supervise the treatment. The maximum treatment time for a medical time out is 3 minutes. For a medical timeout involving bleeding, up to 15 minutes is allowed.
- The "Little Mo" Point Penalty System begins with a warning, then forfeiture of a point, then forfeiture of a game, followed by an additional loss of game or default as determined by the Referee and Tournament Director. An immediate default can also be used in egregious situations as determined by the Referee and Tournament Director. Violations include ball abuse, racquet abuse, obscenities, yelling/crying or being a distraction, parental interference, coaching, and anything else that could be considered unsportsmanlike conduct.
- Only players (not parents) may call for an official to be on the court, but parents can be helpful in alerting officials of any problems. The only reason players may leave court is to obtain an official. However, a player must first raise their racquet high so that an official can see it and come to the court.
- Parents are **not** allowed to lean on the fence or interfere with the match in any way.
- No cell phones, smart watches or electronic devices are allowed while on court. Also, please do not talk on your cell phone near the tennis courts and put it on "silent" while matches are in progress.
- If a player needs to go to the bathroom, they need to get permission from an official. To minimize loss of momentum during the set caused by a bathroom break, the player(s) taking the break will give a courtesy point to their opponent(s). This is not a penalty point. A courtesy point will not be given for a bathroom break taken at the end of a set. This rule is unique to the "Little Mo" tournaments.



A NOTE TO PLAYERS:

The sun can be intense so please make sure you are well hydrated before coming to the court. Start drinking liquids the night before (starting the morning of your match is too late). **Water and ice should be available at all playing sites.** Be sure to use sunscreen and apply it at least thirty minutes before each match.

Since officials will be calling foot faults, you may want to check your serves during practice sessions to make sure your feet are not touching the baseline until after the ball is hit. Make sure all cell phones and electronic devices are turned off and left with your parent before entering the court. In order to be considered a good sport, you must display good sportsmanship both on and off the court

Good sportsmanship includes:

- saying "good shot" to your opponent when deserved or "nice try" when an opponent makes a great effort at trying to get the ball.
- not pumping your fist at the opponent at any time, especially after a good shot.
- not screaming out at any time during the match including "come on", "vamos", etc.
- not hitting the ball to the back fence or into the net in anger at any time.
- handing the balls nicely to your opponent or hitting the balls softly and accurately to your opponent during the match (i.e. change of server).
- not asking "are you sure" after each of opponent's line calls (please request an official).


The officials on court will be watching for the behaviors listed above. It is also important to make proper line calls. If you are unsure of a call, the benefit of the doubt goes to the opponent. A ball that is 99% out is 100% in. When a player deliberately makes incorrect calls in order to gain an advantage, everyone in the crowd who is watching the match sees it and your opponent knows it as well. This reputation will follow you for the rest of your junior career and we do not want that to happen to you. Let the memory of your match be a good one for both you and your opponent, whether you win or lose. Please request an official at any time if you need anything. Also, please review the rules/scoring format before your first match so you know what is to be expected.

A NOTE TO PARENTS:

Watching the match can be a hard job for parents, especially if there is a problem or a questionable call. Although staying uninvolved is difficult, it is necessary. Once your player enters the court, it is their match. Explain to your child that they will be on their own once they step onto the court and that you will not be able to talk to or coach them in any way during the match. Emphasize and explain good sportsmanship and why it is important. Also, a friendly reminder for all multilingual parents and coaches to only speak or cheer in English when your player is on court. Please remember that appropriate cheering is allowed, however it must be in English so that officials are able to monitor for coaching.

Parents are not allowed to talk on cell phones near the courts when matches are in progress. Parents are also not allowed to make any calls or assist in any scoring disputes, as that is the job of the official. Coaching is not permitted at any time (i.e. hand signals or anything that is instructional such as "stay on your game plan", "make him/her play", and "focus"). Also, inappropriate cheering is not allowed (i.e. clapping at opponent's mistake, excessive or loud clapping). It is proper court etiquette to cheer for all good shots of both players. Maureen Connolly was known for her competitive tennis as well as her good sportsmanship. It is our hope that as parents, you will set a good example for your child during the tournament and follow the gold standard of sportsmanship and kindness.

If something is in need of attention (i.e., a player is out of water, a player is having a health issue, a racquet needs to be returned to the player, a ball is lost over the fence, et cetera), the player must get an official's attention and request their assistance. Only players (not parents) may call for an official to be on the court, but parents can be helpful in alerting officials of any problems.



Want to play in another "Little Mo" Regionals to try and qualify for the Nationals?

Just a friendly reminder that players may compete in any "Little Mo" Regionals regardless of where they are currently living in the United States or its territories. Players may also compete in as many regional tournaments as they would like, but they only need to participate in one regional tournament and finish in the top four (yellow ball division only) to qualify for the "Little Mo" Nationals. Registration for all four regional tournaments will be on a first-come, first-served basis up to the entry limit - we will be accepting the first 32 players in each division. If a division reaches the entry limit before the registration deadline, a WAITING LIST will be established at that time. Be sure to register early as the draws typically fill before the registration deadline! *Please note that once you have received a confirmation email from UTR/Stripe, your player's entry has been accepted into the tournament and you can make your travel arrangements.

The 2024 "Little Mo" Slam!

Have you ever dreamed of winning the tallest trophy in junior tennis?

Born in San Diego, Maureen became the first woman to achieve the Grand Slam of tennis in 1953 by winning all four major championships (Australian, French, Wimbledon, and US Open) in the same year. She was well known for her powerful groundstrokes from the baseline, which earned her the famous nickname "Little Mo" - a comparison to the explosive firepower of the battleship USS *Missouri*, also known as "Big Mo". Only five players in the history of tennis have won the calendar Grand Slam, and Maureen is still the only American woman and the youngest at age 18 to have accomplished this magnificent feat. She won an amazing nine consecutive championship titles (three US, three Wimbledon, two French, one Australian) - undefeated in 50 matches.

In 2013, MCB created the ultimate challenge for any player (ages 8-12) to win the "Little Mo" Slam. The Slam was created in honor of Maureen Connolly's Grand Slam win in 1953 - winning all four major championships (Australian, French, Wimbledon, and US Open) in the same calendar year. If a "Little Mo" player can win their **yellow ball division** at all three Internationals (Colorado, New Jersey, Florida) in the same year, they will receive the tallest trophy in junior tennis (6 feet tall) and the title of "Little Mo" Slam Champion! The Slam continues this year with the 1st leg at the U.S. Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs, Colorado (June 28 - July 3). The 2nd leg will be held at the West Orange Tennis Club in West Orange, New Jersey (August 17-21). The 3rd and final leg will take place at the Palm Beach Gardens Tennis Center in Palm Beach Gardens, Florida (December 6-11). There have been eleven players who have accomplished this magnificent feat in the past eleven years.

You also represent your family, coaches, friends, tennis academy, and club so we ask you to be the *best* you can be and display outstanding sportsmanship on and off the court.

Maureen Connolly was known for her powerful groundstrokes, but more importantly for her exemplary sportsmanship and kindness on and off the court. To honor her legacy, the "Little Mo" tournaments offer special "Mo" Coins to players who display good sportsmanship and who are respectful and kind to others. The referee, officials, and tournament staff will have the colorful "Mo" Coins in their pockets to give to players during the event. All players will be able to trade in their coins for prizes at the "Little Mo" Booth during the tournament.

We are so excited to have you in the tournament! It is our hope these "Mo" Coins will encourage good sportsmanship, friendship, and kindness whenever you play tennis.

To earn "Mo" Coins:

Exhibit Good Sportsmanship:

- a) Calls lines fairly and keeps up with the right score
- b) Hits the balls back nicely to the server
- c) Congratulates their opponent after a great point
- d) Does not show any anger, throw their racquet or scream out "come on"
- e) Shakes their opponent's hand after the match
- f) Responds in a respectful manner to all officials and tournament staff

Help Others:

- a) Offers to help the tournament staff if they need any assistance
- b) Picks up items to help keep the tournament site clean
- c) Holds the door open for someone who is carrying a lot of items









The "Little Mo" Story



Maureen Catherine Connolly Brinker, affectionately called "Little Mo", was born on September 17, 1934 in San Diego, California. She began playing tennis at age nine in 1945 on the public courts of the Balboa Tennis Club in San Diego.

Although her career spanned three years, many premier sportswriters consider her to be the finest of all female players. In 1953 at the age of 18, she was the first woman to win the "Grand Slam" of tennis by claiming all four major events in one calendar year (Australian, French, Wimbledon, and US Open). She lost only one set in the process. She is still the only American woman and the youngest to have accomplished this magnificent feat. To put the significance of her "Grand Slam" achievement into perspective, only five players in the history of tennis have won the "Grand Slam" of singles championships.

Nicknamed "Little Mo" for her powerful, accurate ground strokes (a comparison to "Big Mo", the battleship USS *Missouri*), Maureen was devastating from the baseline and seldom needed to go to the net. A small and compact right-hander (5-foot-4), she won her major singles championships as a teenager: three successive Wimbledon titles (1952-54), three consecutive U.S. Championships at Forest Hills (1951-53), two French Championships (1953-54), and one Australian Championships (1953).

Maureen was the #1 junior girl in the nation in 1949 and 1950, winning the 18 and under singles and doubles titles at the National Jr. Championships. In 1951, 1952 and 1953, Maureen was the undisputed world champion. She was voted "Woman Athlete of the Year" by the Associated Press for those three consecutive years.

A cheerful and sporting competitor, Maureen crushed the opposition, never losing an important match, only occasionally losing a set. She helped the U.S. beat Britain in the Wightman Cup matches of 1951-54 by winning all seven of her singles. Nobody has measured up to her perfect record in the majors. She sailed through nine successive majors (three U.S. titles, three Wimbledon titles, two French titles, one Australian titles), unbeaten in 50 matches.

In July 1954, Maureen's playing career ended with heartbreaking suddenness when she was involved in a horseback riding accident. After winning her third consecutive Wimbledon title, she was riding her beloved Tennessee Walker, Colonel Merry Boy, in San Diego with two friends on a private dirt road. A cement truck unexpectedly rounded the corner, sideswiped her horse, and severely injured her leg.

"I knew immediately I'd never play again," Maureen said later.

Although she was unable to compete any longer at her elite championship level, Maureen's love of the sport continued. She dedicated herself to the promotion of the game of tennis, conducting clinics throughout the nation and becoming one of the game's outstanding teachers. Maureen married Norman Brinker in 1955 and had two daughters, Cindy and Brenda. She was inducted into the International Tennis Hall of Fame in 1968. In 1969, she lost her valiant battle with cancer and passed away at the young age of 34.

This remarkable champion is memorialized through her namesake, The Maureen Connolly Brinker Tennis Foundation (MCB), which is dedicated to the promotion and support of junior tennis development worldwide. Maureen's dream of establishing a foundation was based on her desire to give back to the game she loved so much. She was raised by a single mother and due to financial constraints, she was unable to travel to national tournaments. There were a few organizations in California that helped her with travel grants to cover expenses. Maureen thought at that time if she was ever in a position where she could help some young, promising players financially to travel to tournaments in order to improve their rankings, she would do it. This was the seed that was planted over fifty years ago in forming the foundation.

"Whenever a great player comes along you have to ask yourself, 'Could she have beaten Maureen?'" says Lance Tingay of the Daily Telegraph of London. "In every case, the answer is, 'I think not."

"Little Mo" Commemorative Forever Stamp!

The United States Postal Service has issued a beautiful "Little Mo" Commemorative Forever



Stamp in honor of Maureen Connolly Brinker! This special stamp is available for purchase in 33,000 post offices nationwide. We are so happy to have our tennis families share in this meaningful celebration honoring our beloved "Little Mo"!

This issuance honors extraordinary tennis champion Maureen Connolly Brinker (1934-1969). The stamp art features an oil-on-linen painting of the tennis star by Gregory Manchess. Based on a black-and-white photograph taken in 1952, the portrait is a colorful interpretation of Connolly hitting a low volley. Nicknamed "Little Mo," the 5-foot-4-inch dynamo used powerful groundstrokes to become the first woman to win all four major tennis tournaments in a calendar year. Art director Derry Noyes designed the stamp.

"Mom would be thrilled and humbled with this amazing honor by the United States Postal Service," said Cindy Brinker Simmons, president of MCB and daughter of Maureen Connolly Brinker. "She was a remarkable


